- Ink (Charcoal, India Ink, Gunpowder, Earth Pigments, Vermillion)
- Piercing Tools (Bone Splinters, Thorns, Sharp Teeth, Needles)
- Pricked in / Scratched in
- Ink on Needle / Rubbed into Wound






















F16, 48. Tattooed design, "mark of honor" (Osage).




